Biodiversity Month

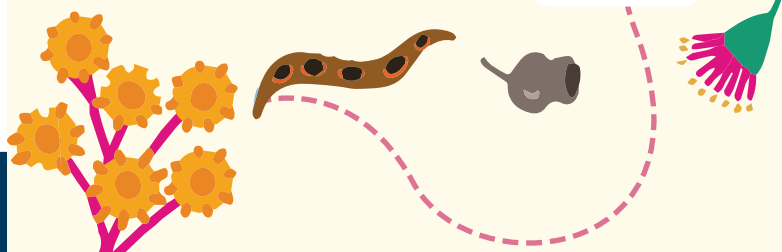
September is Biodiversity Month, a celebration of Cockburn's remarkable ecosystems and the abundant life that is all around us.

Building a safe and secure future

Cutting-edge technology

One of the components of our safety strategy is our state-of-the-art CCTV network comprising more than 700 cameras strategically placed in high-risk areas. This advanced network is continuously monitored from multiple platforms, including the CoSafe operations room. We aim to establish one of the most significant systems in Perth, with plans to expand the CCTV network over the next five years.

We also employ innovative technologies like licence plate recognition cameras to bolster security measures.

Free 24/7 mobile safety patrol service

We offer the CoSafe service to further ensure the safety of our community. CoSafe has an impressive average response time of under 10 minutes, and we encourage residents to report any matters or concerns to the team unless it involves an offence or urgent situation that should be reported to the appropriate emergency service.

WA Police and Neighbourhood Watch collaborations

Through these partnerships, we advocate for a stronger presence of law enforcement in our community. Additionally, we offer initiatives like the CCTV home rebate (see page 11) and Seniors Security Subsidy Scheme to further enhance safety measures.

Increasing education and awareness

Throughout the year, we run various programs aimed at raising awareness about safety and preventing crime. These initiatives educate our community and empower residents to play an active role in maintaining a secure environment.

Improving the look of our streets

The City is committed to preserving and enhancing its natural and urban spaces for the enjoyment of residents and future generations. Since 2018, the number of street trees on City land has increased by 67 per cent, totalling 63,500 trees maintained by the City. We also annually plant trees and shrubs in our parks and bushland, with plans to add over 40,000 natural area plants and 1,200 street trees in 2023-24.

Working together

Both residents and the City share the responsibility of increasing the number of trees, shrubs and vegetation throughout our suburbs. Through a joint approach, we can improve the look of our suburbs, expand wildlife habitat, reap a multitude of environmental benefits and cultivate a cool and comfortable environment.

Incentives for residents

Residents can take advantage of the many offerings and incentives provided by the City to make Cockburn greener, including:

- Native plant subsidy – discounted native plants for residents each May
- Waterwise verge rebate of up to \$250, plus 25 free native tubestocks, free soil improver and soil wetting granules

- Native plant subsidy for schools
- Landowner Biodiversity Grants
- Community planting days
- Workshops and other educational forums
- Street trees for resident verges.

Verge maintenance

We encourage residents to maintain their verges, as regular upkeep enhances the appearance of properties, streets and neighbourhoods. In 2023-24, the City will increase mowing frequency for residential verges not adjacent to properties as well as verges in industrial and rural areas.

Additional funding will be allocated for maintaining narrow verges and untidy areas near residential properties. The tree maintenance budget will also increase, and watering schedules for new trees in summer will increase to three times a week.

Maintaining our places to play

The City maintains 350 parks, 22 sporting reserves and 220 playgrounds (see page 12). That's a lot of places to have fun.

Parks and playgrounds are a priority for our residents, and we are very proud of the fabulous range across Cockburn. One of our favourites is majestic Manning Park in Hamilton Hill/Spearwood which encompasses Manning Lake and the limestone ridge to the west of the wetland.

The park has some magnificent old trees and great facilities to cater for all occasions – it is often booked for weddings and other family celebrations.

There is significant flora and fauna in the lake and surrounding wetland areas – something to look out for as spring is just around the corner.

The Davilak Trail is popular with walking enthusiasts and can take between 30 minutes and two hours to complete. The trail runs from behind the Azelia Ley Homestead Museum (Museum open Sunday afternoons) and across the ridge, with spectacular views of Cockburn Sound and the Perth CBD. The trail takes in the 192 steps known as Manning Stairs, Cockburn's version of Perth's famous Jacob's Ladder.

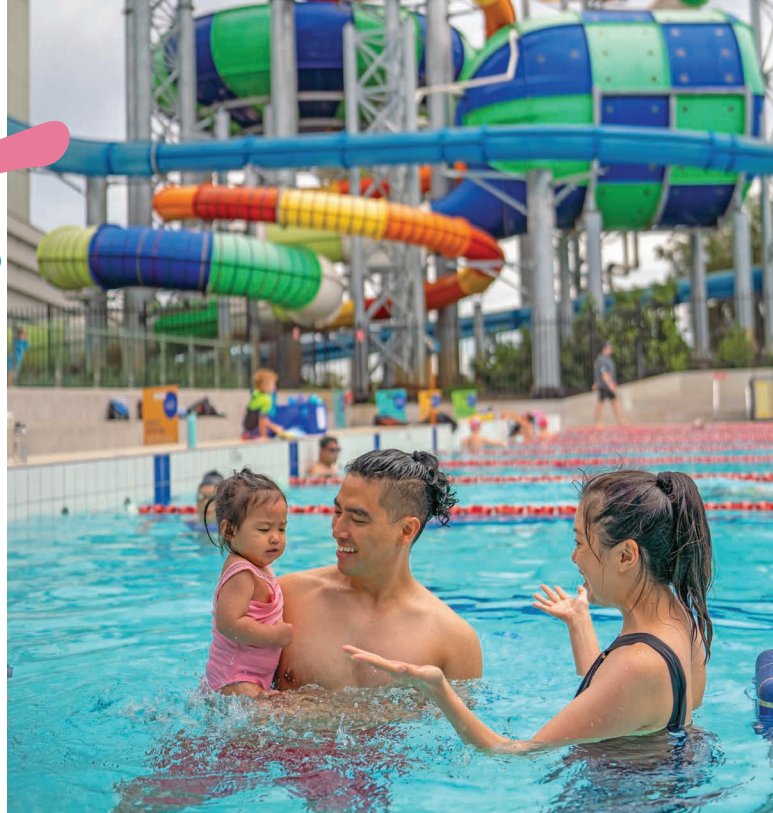
A spotlight on your favourites

Peace Park revamp in progress

Upgrades at Peace Park in Spearwood are taking shape as contractors repair the footpath and install a new gazebo, picnic setting, signage, and park benches.

The small neighbourhood park serves to commemorate the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and symbolises peace and unity.

In June, workers pruned dead branches and planted four Peppermint Trees and 17 Ginkgo bilobas. Ginkgos hold profound significance in Hiroshima, embodying resilience and hope, while the Peppermints will provide future habitat for black cockatoos.

Perth artist Esti Nagy will add the park's finishing touches with two footpath murals inspired by traditional Japanese art, patterns and symbolism.

The City sought design direction from residents, representatives from the Mayor's for Peace Organisation and representatives from the Consulate-General of Japan in Perth for the \$150,000 project.

Boats around the Coogee Maritime Trail

The City is preparing a report to Council about boat and mooring areas near the award-winning Coogee Maritime Trail, following consultation with over 250 people.

The City invited the community to share their perspectives on a potential trial of moorings within the 8-knot boating zone near the trail, or the possibility of eliminating the 8-knot boating zone entirely to enhance swimmer safety.

The City will present the report at a Council meeting this quarter. The report will summarise the consultation findings and recommend the next steps, including

possibly advocating for the Department of Transport (DoT) to make the suggested changes. The DoT is responsible for boating regulations, so the City cannot implement the changes without DoT support.

The plan contains a range of initiatives, including but not limited to:

- Ensuring that new buildings exceed minimum disability requirements where possible
- Documenting accessible features of Cockburn facilities on the City's website
- Providing disability awareness training to City employees
- Continuing to improve the accessibility of the City's website
- Creating more employment opportunities for people with disability.

The plan follows a robust community consultation process that captured the views of over 280 people of all abilities, and community and volunteer organisations.

COMEDY FESTIVAL

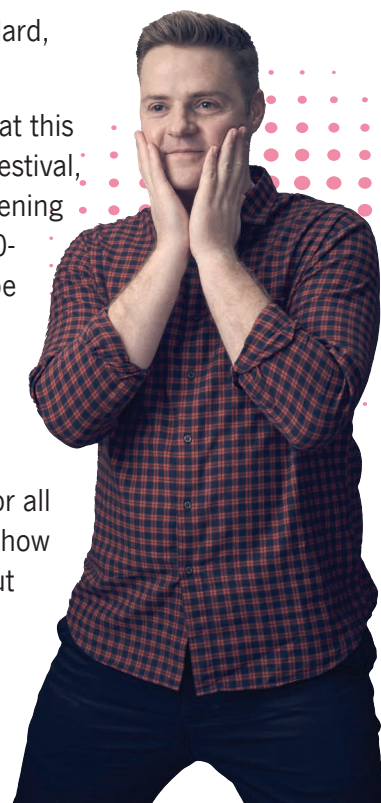

Cockburn delivers ratepayers value for money

We believe Cockburn is the best place in Australia to live, work and play, so we pay close attention to making sure we live up to that promise for our residents and businesses.

What’s coming to Cockburn in 2023-24?

Just like our community, the City is operating in a challenging, high-cost environment, paying more just to sustain current service levels.

As a sensible approach to the current economic climate, the City is prioritising the maintenance of existing assets and infrastructure over new projects for 2023-24 but remains focused on delivering high-quality services and facilities for our residents and businesses.

As a resident, what do I receive from the City of Cockburn?

In a continuing environment of high inflation, rising interest rates, high construction costs and a tight labour market, the City of Cockburn’s 2023-24 rates will continue to be some of the lowest in Perth, and significantly behind Consumer Price Index increases.

The City of Cockburn offers its ratepayers a diverse range of amenities and services. These include the upkeep of parks, playgrounds, trees, roads, footpaths, and community facilities, as well as management of Port Coogee Marina. We place a strong emphasis on sustainability, waste management and coastal protection, demonstrating our commitment to preserving the environment.

We actively support local businesses, organising workshops, training programs and events that foster growth and development, benefiting both the community and the broader region.



For 2023-24 the City’s budget of \$43.82m will cover various initiatives, including:

CCTV home rebate Up to 50% off the cost!

We are excited to announce the launch of the CCTV rebate program, a new initiative aimed at bolstering the security of our community. Under this program, residents can receive a rebate of up to 50 per cent off the total cost of their new or upgraded CCTV system, to a maximum of \$500. By taking advantage of this opportunity, you can enhance your home security while saving money.

Am I eligible for the rebate?

To be eligible for the subsidy, applicants must be residents of the City of Cockburn and either the property owner, an authorised agent or a tenant with the property owner's consent. Please note that if you are already receiving funding through the Seniors Security Rebate for CCTV, you cannot claim the CCTV rebate.

What does the rebate cover?

The subsidy covers both newly installed CCTV systems and upgrades to existing ones, as long as they meet the minimum technical requirements specified in the application. Additionally, applicants must register their camera locations on the WA Police Force CAM-MAP, which will assist WA Police to investigate incidents and improve community safety.

How do I apply for the rebate?

By registering for the CCTV rebate program, you not only protect your home but also contribute to creating a safer community for everyone.

Why do you believe Cockburn is the best place to be?

The best thing about Cockburn (IMO) is the astounding variety everywhere – in nature and in our increasingly multicultural population. We have the best communities, the best volunteers and the best wildlife hospital in the country. You can go snorkelling, walk on the beach or in beautiful bushland, visit a wetland or stroll along the cliffs, all within 10 minutes of home. There are not many places in the world where you can do that.

What are you looking forward to happening in Cockburn?

Over the next year, we're revamping our events program, keeping everyone's favourite events but bringing in some exciting new ones, so that's a few things to look forward to. Further ahead, I'm looking forward to our community wildlife corridor being extraordinary and world-class; I'm excited about building the Aboriginal Cultural and Visitor's Centre and about the extension of the artificial reef, helping reduce coastal erosion as well as creating habitat and encouraging seagrass growth.



Revitalising our well-loved playgrounds

Did you know that Cockburn has around 220 playgrounds? Every year some of these reach the end of their useful lives, so we replace them with new, similar equipment to ensure they remain safe and enjoyable for everyone to use.

The playgrounds that are renewed are chosen based on yearly inspections. This financial year, nine playgrounds will reach the end of their useful lives and receive replacement equipment. These include Bibra Lake Reserve* (Bibra Lake), Matilda Birkett Reserve (Coolbellup), Danjoo and Wheeler Parks (Hamilton Hill), Lucretia Park* (North Coogee), Edwardes and Market Garden* Parks (Spearwood), and Perena Rocchi Reserve (Yangebup)*.

To better meet local community needs, we produce several designs for each playground and ask residents which they prefer. We install the design that receives the most votes. The voting process takes place around the middle of the year, and we renew the playground equipment from October through February.

\$250 waterwise verge rebates available now

Did you know that gardens can use up to 40 per cent of a household's water? Using waterwise gardening practices will help save the environment and your wallet by reducing your water bill.

Replacing thirsty lawn with mulch and planting native flora has countless other benefits. Native plants are hardy and require less maintenance, they attract birds and other local fauna, help replenish the natural habitat and are simply beautiful.

But the best news is that the City and Water Corporation will provide a \$250 subsidy along with seedlings and soil improvers to help you make the transition.

The rebate is open to applications until 30 September.

Meet your neighbours

With our lakes, bushland reserves and pristine beaches, Cockburn is home to a dazzling array of flora and fauna species. These precious native animals are found across Cockburn.

Kwenda (bandicoot)

Kwenda are small, brown marsupials. They feed by digging and poking their pointy snouts into the ground. This digging helps aerate soil and promotes ecological health in our natural areas.

Gnollark (Carnaby's Black-cockatoo)

Carnaby's are large black birds with white tail feathers. They are an endangered species, occurring only in south-western Western Australia.

Yoorn (Bobtail)

Yoorn form monogamous pairs during breeding season and may re-form over several years. They love to eat insects and snails, so if these are poisoned with pest-control pellets then lizards may become ill. Use environmentally friendly alternatives to control pests.

Fauna surveys reveal rich biodiversity in Cockburn

Starting in December 2022, the City partnered with FaunaTrack to begin a series of surveys across our reserves to discover what kind of animals live there.

We were thrilled to find Cockburn is a vibrant and thriving ecosystem with some rare and unusual denizens.

Basic surveys covered Success Reserve, Skaife Park, Sherbrooke Park and Roper Reserve, while more detailed surveys were conducted at Bibra Lake and Yaakan Park.

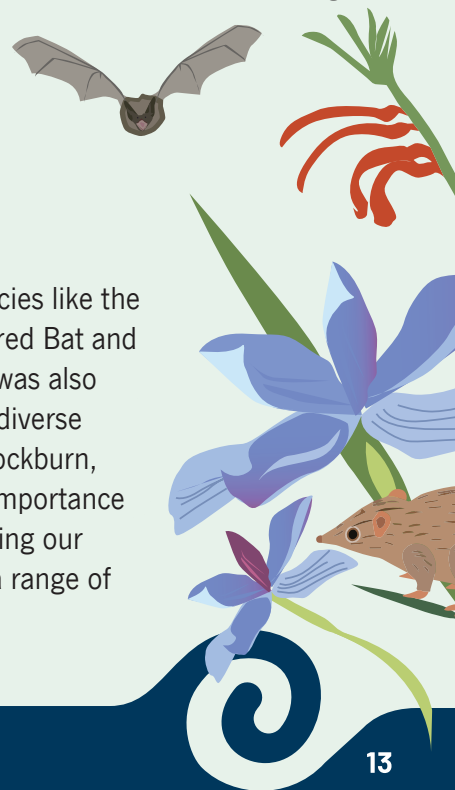
The results showed that many of our reserves are home to native Kwenda and Carnaby's cockatoos along with a range of locally significant birds including Splendid Fairy-wren, Mistletoebird and Rainbow Bee-eaters.

Six different species of microbats were discovered along with high numbers of possums, frogs and reptiles including Western Mourning Skink and Napoleon's Skink.

Notably, Bibra Lake was a haven for wildlife including:

- 6 amphibian species
- 17 reptile species
- 14 mammal species
- 76 bird species.

The detection of rare species like the Western Greater Long-eared Bat and the brush-tailed possum was also noteworthy. With such a diverse range of inhabitants in Cockburn, the surveys showed the importance of protecting and enhancing our reserves and cultivating a range of different habitat types.



Living together in the same space

We all share the same space here in Cockburn, with around 125,000 humans and over 16,000 dogs. It's crucial that dog owners understand the importance of responsible pet ownership to ensure the safety and wellbeing of our community.

Recent incidents have highlighted the need for increased vigilance and control when it comes to our furry friends. From 1 January to 31 May, our rangers issued 71 fines to dog owners who failed to keep their dogs on a leash or were involved in dog attacks, some resulting in injuries. These statistics serve as a wake-up call for all dog owners to take their responsibilities seriously.

A tragic incident occurred recently that serves as a painful reminder of why it is crucial to control our dogs, both on and off-leash. One resident's dog attacked another dog, leading to a devastating outcome and causing grief not only for the family involved but also for community members who witnessed the incident. Our rangers conducted a thorough investigation, which resulted in the resident receiving a \$3,200 fine along with \$1,667 in additional costs.

To ensure the safety of our pets and demonstrate consideration for others, it is imperative we keep our dogs under control, whether they are on or off a leash in public areas. By doing so, we can create a harmonious environment where everyone can live safely and happily together.

Those tree hollows are actually someone's home!

Protecting habitat is one of the most important ways we can ensure our local fauna thrives.

After all, everyone needs a place to live!

One of the more unusual places fauna make their homes in Cockburn is in tree hollows. These cavities form after a tree limb falls and natural processes, like rotting, termites and fungi, break down the heartwood.

Birds, ranging from the tiny Striated Pardalote to parrots, ducks, owls and cockatoos, nest in hollows. Forest Red-tailed Cockatoos have recently nested in both natural and artificial hollows within Cockburn reserves. Other hollow-nesting animals include microbats and possums.

The Rehabilitating Roe 8 project has recently begun a program to monitor tree hollows in the corridor to track how many animals are breeding there. The project has purchased a 'Cocky Cam' (a 12-metre telescopic pole with wireless camera) to carry out these somewhat tricky inspections.

The data gathered will help guide rehabilitation efforts. We hope to share news of successful breeding soon.

Matilda Birkett Reserve, located at the intersection of Coolbellup Avenue and Forrest Road, has recently undergone some extensive landscaping to improve its function and provide additional facilities for visitors.

With a City budget of \$120,000, the enhancements include new turf and irrigation, kerbed garden beds, a new park sign and bench seat, a relocated swing, consolidated playground space with limestone edging, and connected pathways.

The City will replace the playground equipment during 2023-24 as part of a separate project.

These improvements have enhanced the beauty of Matilda Birkett Reserve for locals and visitors alike.

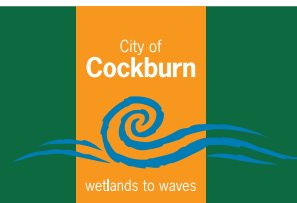
