

Make the most of the Coogee Maritime Trail

The Coogee Maritime Trail is a vibrant coastal experience blending history, art, and marine life.

Located at the northern end of Coogee Beach, the trail features the 1905 Omeo shipwreck, submerged just 25 metres offshore, surrounded by over 55 reef habitats and art installations. Accessible via stairs from Omeo Park, it's a haven for snorkelers, divers, and history enthusiasts.

As the trail's popularity grows, especially during summer, it's essential to enjoy it responsibly. To protect the marine environment and ensure safety, please adhere to the following guidelines:

Avoid touching or climbing the wreck and reef structures to prevent damage

No fishing or power boating within 100 metres of the trail Observe the marine life from a distance without disturbing their natural habitat

By following these simple practices, you help preserve the Coogee Maritime Trail for future generations.

New amenities at Omeo Park

Visitors to the popular Omeo Park and Coogee Maritime Trail can now enjoy brand-new facilities designed to make their coastal experience more comfortable, without compromising the area's natural beauty.

The Port Coogee Southern Amenities Project has delivered much-needed public toilets, changing rooms and a shaded shelter. This answers community calls for amenities near the Omeo shipwreck, which is a favourite destination for families.

The building's low height and minimalist form preserve ocean views for nearby residents, while a modern design featuring natural materials blends with the surrounding Port Coogee architecture.

Safety and security were key priorities, with the inclusion of passive surveillance, clear sightlines and provisions for CCTV to help deter antisocial behaviour.

A new shade shelter offers welcome respite from the sun, and the entire project has been designed with accessibility in mind so everyone can enjoy the park.

Durable, low-maintenance materials have been chosen to reduce environmental impact and ensure the facility remains in excellent condition for years to come.

These upgrades provide comfort and convenience while maintaining the natural beauty that makes Omeo Park a treasured local destination.

The \$2.576m project was delivered with support from the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) program, which contributed \$1.077m. The remaining \$1.499m was funded by the City.

The LRCI program supports Australian councils to deliver priority local road and community infrastructure projects in their region, creating jobs and long-lasting benefits for





Travel the ancient Derbal Nara ocean knowledge trail

The Nyungar People's Ocean Knowledge Trail is a collection of ancient stories about the Cockburn Sound seashore.

Derbal Nara means Cockburn Sound in the Nyungar language.

Search 'Derbal Nara' on our website to explore boodjar (country), moort (family) and katitjin (stories) and learn about the Nyungar people's deep cultural connections to land and sea.

These are the foundations of Nyungar life and identity. This web of life guides how Nyungar people care for each other, honour their ancestors and stay connected to Country.

The webpage explores:

Place names and seasonal knowledge

Family systems

Dreaming stories and oral histories

A glossary of Nyungar words, including audio files for correct pronunciation

Maps, videos and resources

Opportunities to meet local Elders.

The City's Derbal Nara webpage was initially established as a website in a partnership between the City of Cockburn, the City of Cockburn's Aboriginal Reference Group, Curtin University Sustainability Policy Institute and the Centre for Aboriginal Studies.

The key researchers were Professor Len Collard, Associate Professor Laura Stocker and Research Associate Angela Rooney.

Makuru magic in Cockburn







Renew your pet's registration by 31 October

It's that time of year again! Renewing your pet's registration is quick and easy — and helps keep them safe.

All dogs over three months old and cats over six months must be microchipped and registered by law.

You can renew online in just a few clicks. Choose from annual, three-year or lifetime registration — and if you're a pensioner, you'll receive a 50 per cent discount.



Why register your pet?



If they go missing, our Rangers can help bring them home faster.



Your registration helps us plan and deliver better local facilities.



Most importantly – it's the law. Avoid fines of over \$200 by keeping your pet registered.

Need to update your details?

If you've recently moved house, changed phone numbers, transferred pet ownership, or no longer need to renew, let us know. Thank you for doing your part to keep pets safe and our community pet-friendly.

Create a thriving summer garden that supports wildlife

Your garden is more than a place to relax. It's a vital habitat for native birds, insects and animals.

Summer in Cockburn can be tough on gardens, but simple waterwise practices make all the difference. Mulching helps retain moisture and keeps roots cool, while planting native species ensures your garden is tough and suited to our climate.

Looking after verge trees is also key. They provide shade and shelter for wildlife and improve the look and value of our streets. While we provide watering in the first few years if we've planted your verge tree, an extra bucket of water during the hot months helps newly planted trees thrive.

You're encouraged to nurture wildlife through our Habitat for Homes program, helping you create welcoming spaces for local creatures.

Don't forget the little things – a birdbath can be an essential resource for local birdlife during hot months. Take advantage of our 50 per cent rebate (up to \$50) to help with birdbath purchases. You can also place shallow dishes of water out for reptiles and insects – don't forget to add a few rocks so they have a way to climb out.

Protect snake-necked turtles this nesting season

Cockburn's wetlands are home to the near-threatened snake-necked turtle, a unique species under pressure from habitat loss, predators and vehicle strikes.

Between September and December, females travel up to a kilometre from the water to find a nesting site, making this their most vulnerable time.

We're taking action to protect these turtles through feral animal control, habitat restoration, turtle population studies, and our community-driven Turtle Trackers program. Volunteers monitor nesting females, record sightings, and help safeguard nests from predators. Since 2019, this citizen science effort has shown the power of community involvement in protecting vulnerable species.

Here's how you can help, too:



Give them space – watch from a distance and protect them from predators



Let them finish their journey – don't pick them up or return them to the water if they're nesting



Report sightings – log them on the TurtleSAT app or website



Help injured turtles – contact WA Wildlife Hospital on 9417 7105.

Together, we can ensure these ancient reptiles remain part of Cockburn's wetlands for generations to come.



How to deal with hazardous waste

Old paint tins, dead batteries, weedkillers, pool chemicals - they don't belong in your kerbside bin. Not only can they harm our workers and environment, they also can cause fires in rubbish trucks and facilities.

Cockburn residents can drop off up to 20 kilograms or litres of household hazardous waste free of charge at Henderson Waste Recovery Park (48 Dalison Avenue), thanks to the State Government's Household Hazardous Waste Program.

It's a quick, safe way to protect your family and pets and our local environment.

Did you know there are also community recycling hubs across Cockburn for smaller items like batteries, light globes, printer cartridges and mobile phones? You'll find them at a range of locations including Cockburn ARC, our libraries, and local community centres. Find dropoff locations and more info on



Help shape the future of your community

The City of Cockburn local government elections will take place on Saturday 18 October 2025 to fill five Councillor vacancies and the office of the Mayor, each for a four-year term.



Local government elections are a significant event for the community, and it's important to be informed about the process and the importance of participating.

Why vote in local elections?

Your vote can make a difference in shaping the future of your community. The decisions made by your elected Council directly affect you. By voting, you help choose who represents your interests and decides the future of local services, parks, infrastructure and community projects.

Council approves budgeting and rates, balancing the provision of services and infrastructure with keeping rates at an appropriate level.



When and how to vote

You should receive your voting pack in the mail by late September. If you don't, you can collect a new one from the City's Administration Centre or Success Library, provided you are on the electoral roll.

Votes must be received by the Returning Officer by 6pm, 18 October to be counted. If you do not post your vote by Monday, 13 October 2025, we strongly encourage you to drop it off in person at the City's Administration Centre or Success Library, during opening hours, so it makes it back in time. The City's Administration Office will be open from 8am to 6pm on Saturday 18 October for you to drop off your vote.

Be prepared for bushfire season

With summer here, now's the time to get bushfire ready. If you live near bushland or grassland, follow the City's Fire Control Order: clear firebreaks, maintain an Asset Protection Zone, and keep your property free from flammable material.

Create a bushfire plan (and include your pets) and prepare an emergency kit with essentials like documents, water, first aid, and protective clothing. Don't rely on scheme water; have an independent supply if you plan to stay and defend.

The friendly faces behind community safety

You've probably seen our CoSafe patrol vehicles driving through your suburb, checking in on parks and local facilities, or in residential areas during holiday periods. But who are the people behind the wheel? And what exactly is CoSafe?

Let's clear something up first: CoSafe is not the police or a security crowd control service in the way many people might think. CoSafe is made up of diverse, caring individuals who come from all walks of life – a multicultural team that proudly reflects the community they serve in the City of Cockburn.

"We're not here to show force; we're here to engage and promote wellbeing" says one CoSafe officer.

"Most of what we do is about being a visible, reassuring presence. We check in when something doesn't look right. We respond when people need help. And we do a lot of behind-the-scenes work to keep our public spaces safe and welcoming."

CoSafe patrols operate 24/7, every day
of the year. They assist with everything from
responding to suspicious activity, conducting
patrols around the neighbourhood while residents are
on holiday, supporting police with CCTV footage and
proactive patrols or providing the City's Public Health
team with reports related to noise complaints.

CoSafe also checks on our City facilities, responds to alarms, and assists with after-hours support for Rangers Services tasks. Above all, they're here for you.
