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

CoSafe – we're here to help.

Our CoSafe safety and security service keeps your family safe and ensures the amenity of your local neighbourhood. So how do we do this, and what type of issues do we help our community solve?

CoSafe relies on the community to tell us when they see unusual or illegal activity. In addition to our patrols, this allows for more 'eyes on the street' and more market intelligence.

CoSafe also has a close partnership with WA Police, utilising each other's data, analytics, and resources. This partnership, and the information we receive from the community, allows us to identify hotspots and issues before they escalate, deploy resources efficiently, and ultimately find an effective and timely solution.

Our Officers in action

CoSafe Officers are extensively trained and equipped for all situations. Recently, CoSafe received a call from a vigilant community member who witnessed a Cockburn facility being broken into. A CoSafe Officer quickly attended the site and saw offenders running away from the alleged crime. A foot chase ensued before the offender jumped into a backyard where he was confronted by a group of gardening women who surrounded him until the CoSafe Officer arrived.

Aside from vandalism, crime, noise complaints and anti-social behaviour, we like to help our community, as shown in this message from the sister of a vulnerable young man with a disability.

"Heinrich (CoSafe Officer) found my younger brother on the way to the shops. He has a disability, and Heinrich was very kind and treated him very well. Heinrich offered to take him to the shops on a hot day and get him something to eat which I really appreciated. He was very understanding as to why my brother had escaped and took extra details to ensure if it happens again, what would be the correct action to take."

Improving your journey through Cockburn

We understand that traffic congestion in Cockburn is frustrating, especially around Cockburn Central, Kwinana Freeway at Berrigan Drive and along our major connecting roads running EW and NS across the City.

The City has long term plans to accommodate a growing population and provide transport networks to where people live and work. We are working with all levels of government to improve the network and offer more sustainable, bike and pedestrian-friendly options to keep our community connected, safe and happy.

When planning for our roads and transport networks, the City implements 'green infrastructure', or elements of nature into the design to make our suburbs more attractive, protect them against excessive heat and improve air, soil, and water quality.



What are the short-term focus areas?

The projects listed on the page opposite are in the process of construction or recently completed. There are many more projects in the pipeline that are planned for delivery by the City, State and/or Federal government over the next 10 years. These are detailed in the City's 10-year Integrated Transport Strategy 2020-2030 which aligns with State and Federal government transport plans.

Cockburn Central

To improve traffic flow at Cockburn Central:

- Building Armadale Road to North Lake Road Bridge ... COMPLETED
- Armadale Road widening COMPLETED
- Additional PTA eastern carpark at train station, Knock Place realignment COMPLETED

Berrigan Drive

To reduce congestion getting on/off the freeway at Berrigan Drive:

- Jandakot Road widening (Stage 2 – Solomon Road to Berrigan Drive) MID 2022
- Kwinana Freeway widening COMPLETED
- Karel Avenue widening (in part) COMPLETED

Major roads running east-west and north-south

To improve the journey through Cockburn from east to west, north to south and vice versa:

- Hammond Road widening (between Branch Circus and Bartram Road) MID 2023
- North Lake Road/Farrington Road 2nd right turn lane... EARLY 2022
- Stock Road and Beeliar Drive intersection upgrade COMPLETED
- Spearwood Avenue widening (in part) COMPLETED

Other projects

- New Thornlie to Cockburn Link (rail) LATE 2024
- Smart Freeway COMPLETED
- Ever expanding network of shared paths and bike friendly roads ONGOING

While much is being done to alleviate traffic congestion, it takes time and requires a coordinated approach by all levels of government. As space for more roads and vehicle-related infrastructure will reduce in the future, we strongly encourage our community to cycle, walk or car share wherever possible. This is the only long-term sustainable way to alleviate traffic congestion.

\$9m upgrade for Beale Park

Feedback was sought on a draft design for Beale Park, which, among other things, includes a new playground and multi-purpose sporting and community building.

The draft design was prepared following tree surveys, a Carnaby's Cockatoo habitat assessment, and input from local residents and the Cockburn City Soccer Club.

Feedback is being considered, alongside recommendations from environmental consultants and if required, the Australian Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment, to guide the final design. Construction is expected to begin in early 2023.

Dog on-leash beach in Cockburn

To understand community perceptions, a survey was conducted in late 2021 by an external market research company. Feedback was considered at the February Council meeting, alongside a range of factors such as operational constraints and management guidelines. Your budget requests are in

Residents associations across Cockburn were recently invited to share their community's top priorities for consideration in the 2022-23 draft capital works budget. Three projects with a combined value of up to \$30,000 could be put forward.

Projects supported by the City will be presented to Council for consideration at the July 2022 Ordinary Council Meeting.

Locals discuss Manning Park trail formalisation

18 representatives were selected to be part of a community working group to discuss the opportunities, challenges and constraints with formalising some of the trails in Manning Park's upland area.

Members were selected independently through an expression of interest process. Selected participants held a range of technical experience and skills such as conservation and sustainable land use. Members include representatives from the following user groups: Cockburn Community Wildlife Corridor, Friends of Manning Ridge, Aboriginal Reference Group, local residents' associations, trail runners, mountain bike riders, and orienteers.

Key findings of this process are being summarised and further community consultation will take place. At this stage, the project is only a consideration and no decisions on the trail network have been made. For updates visit: www.cockburn.wa.gov.au/ManningParkFacts

Beach erosion trial underway in March

A 100m long engineering fringing reef will be installed at C.Y. O'Connor Beach in March 2022 as part of a unique coastal management trial. The reef is the first of its kind in WA.

135 precast concrete reef modules will be installed offshore in front of Rollinson Road to break down wave energy reaching the shore and slow erosion rates.


City of Cockburn Project Manager Jonathan McKay said the project would test the reef's potential to control erosion while enhancing marine habitat and having minimal impact on the beach, as opposed to more conventional groynes and seawalls.

The City and UWA will monitor the reef over the next few years to understand how it performs and affects the surrounding coastline, and the reef could be reconfigured, reduced or expanded over time.

The project is part-funded by the WA Department of Transport Coastal Adaptation and Protection grant scheme and is being designed and built by Henderson-based company Subcon with coastal engineering

support from M P Rogers & Associates and the University of Western Australia (UWA).

In autumn 2022, the City will also bury a Geotextile Sand Container (GSC) wall into the sand and revegetate the onshore dunes next to the reef as an erosion backstop measure to protect park assets in rare super-storm events, as well as undertake sand replenishment on the south side of the Catherine Point Groyne to address beach erosion in this area prior to winter. The GSC wall and revegetation is part-funded by a Coastwest grant from the WA Planning Commission.



What's happening at Port Coogee Marina?

The third stage of the \$5.6m Port Coogee Marina expansion project is well underway, with completion expected soon.

There will be 70 new concrete floating berths for vessels ranging from 8-25m in length, three new floating jetties, a new loading berth, and two new gatehouses for our boaties. Land lovers will enjoy strolls along the new timber waterfront boardwalk, which will be lovely on a warm summer evening.

A focus on fish

The team at the marina has applied to be reaccredited for Level 3 Clean Marina with the Marina Industries Association. The certification is an international, voluntary accreditation system for marinas which shows they are undertaking various measures to reduce pollution from boating and marina facilities.

The marina team has also started its year-long monitoring program focusing on fish and coral diversity. Seven species of coral were found in the marina in 2018/19, and their health and size are being monitored closely by the team.

City Growth

Upgrades to Goodchild Park, Hamilton Hill

The upgrade and extensions to Goodchild Park clubrooms in Hamilton Hill have begun, and include:

- 2 x new unisex change rooms
- New umpire's room
- New first aid room
- New external park UAT (Universal Accessible Toilet)
- Improved storage facilities (internal and external)
- Upgraded internal toilets (male, female and UAT)
- Upgraded kitchen/kiosk facilities
- Upgraded clubroom space.

Home to the Phoenix Lacrosse Club, the upgrades will encourage more female participation in sport with new unisex changerooms and improved toilet facilities. New lighting will also increase the reserve's availability at night for training, allowing more of the community, including women to train outside of daylight hours. New visitors changerooms will enable the clubs to host larger events, and for fitness groups or dog walkers in the area, there will be new toilet facilities external to the main building that can be used. The facility will re-open in July 2022.

This community project was supported by the State Government through the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries.

Our long-term plan for growth and change in Cockburn

The City is updating its Local Planning Strategy which details the 10-15 year plan for growth and change in Cockburn. We will be consulting with our community on what they think of the draft strategy, so keep an eye out on our news channels for when this takes place and how you can get involved.

What is the Local Planning Strategy?

The Local Planning Strategy is a long-term plan that identifies strategies and actions to address what is important to our community, and how to deal with new challenges faced by the City.

It will inform the preparation of a new town planning scheme and guide an update to the land use and development framework.

The strategy sets the framework for how we can make Cockburn more liveable in the following areas:

Environment

Urban growth and housing

Economy and employment

Infrastructure.

The City will be conducting community consultation on the draft strategy, with timelines dependent on when we receive consent to advertise from the Western Australian Planning Commission. We will let our community know when the consultation period opens.

Environmental

What happens to the contents of your garden organics lime green bin?

Most homes in Cockburn have a lime green-lid bin for garden organic waste like leaves, grass and branches.

The City collects these bins fortnightly and takes the contents to Henderson Waste Recovery Park. Here, the garden waste is transformed into mulch which is free for residents to collect and use.

It is very important to keep contaminants out of your green lid bin as contaminated garden waste will go to landfill, rather than reused.



Youth Employment

The City's Youth Services team offer a range of programs that can help young people land their first gig.

Employ Me

Free one-on-one support for all things career and work related. This includes help with writing resumes and cover letters, applying for jobs, developing interview skills and general career advice.

Residents aged 14-24 are eligible. Each session is 30 minutes and can be in-person or online. The program runs every Thursday, 3.30-5pm.

80% of young people who attended *Employ Me* in 2021 got a job within four weeks.

Entrepreneurship Program

The City runs free workshops that are hands-on and put participants through the motions of designing and developing their own social enterprises. They walk away with real practical skills like prototyping and pitching to help create their own opportunities.

Partnering with local businesses

In July 2021, the City partnered with local café and roaster Leaf Bean Machine to offer barista training to 20 local young people aged 15-18 years.

The course was free and gave participants employable skills. The City is looking into renewing the program with Leaf Bean Machine and potentially expanding into other training programs with local businesses.

Environmental

Education and the environment

It is important for our kids to learn about nature and how we can protect and enrich our native habitat.

Every year the City's environmental team runs a suite of workshops, schemes and partnerships to help schools connect their students to nature and develop their knowledge about sustainability.

Sustainability Grants

Applications for grants up to \$4,000 are open February to March for projects designed to safeguard the environment. Schools are encouraged to be creative with their applications and project ideas.

Environmental Education Grants

Grants of up to \$1,000 are offered to schools for professional environmental educators to present and run activities (incursions and excursions), and workshops for students. Grants open March and no co-contributions are necessary.

Schools Native Plant Scheme

Local primary and secondary schools can apply to receive 40 free local native plants for their school gardens during May. Schools are required to register by Monday 19 April.

Climate Clever App

Schools in Cockburn receive a 50 per cent discount when signing up to the Climate Clever App. The app helps schools track and reduce their carbon footprint, reach sustainability goals and save money! Cockburn households can also access the app for \$15.

Sustainability Workshops for Early Years Educators

The City has partnered with Little Green Steps to offer subsidised sustainability workshops for early years educators. Workshops introduce what sustainability means for children aged 0-8 years and are connected to the National Quality Standards and Early Years Learning Framework.



Environmental School Term Programs

Environmental Services offer climate change, sustainability and environmental education excursions and in-class activities through our Wetlands to Waves Environmental Education Program. Activities include re-vegetation and plantings, the Turtle Watch program, climate change excursions, clean up days and more.

Protect our shipwreck

The Cockburn coastline is home to a unique and precious piece of maritime history.

The Omeo shipwreck lies just 25 metres off the shore of Coogee Beach. The now haunting and coral-encrusted wreck is what remains of a 163-year-old English iron steamship. The vessel was used to lay the Bass Strait and overland telegraph cables. It was involved in international and inter-colonial trade and passenger travel, before coming adrift from Fremantle port in 1905 and getting bogged in the sands at Coogee.

It now makes for a beautiful and mysterious feature for divers and snorkelers along our award-winning Coogee Maritime Trail. However, the wreck is extremely vulnerable to damage with natural degradation accelerating in recent years.


A major cause of this is misuse.



The wreck is not a pontoon or diving platform.

When swimmers climb on it, the wreck breaks and collapses in parts. The Omeo is federally protected and standing on or taking parts of the wreck without a permit is an offence under the Commonwealth Underwater Cultural Heritage Act 2018.

Next time you head to Coogee Beach for a swim or snorkel, please encourage others to look but not touch the wreck. We can all do our part to preserve this amazing artefact for future generations.



Treeby Community & Sports Centre

City Growth

Cockburn Central – capital of the south metro

Did you know that the City of Cockburn is one of the fastest-growing communities south of the Perth CBD? By 2030, Cockburn's population is expected to increase from almost 120,000 to more than 150,000. At the heart of this rapid growth is Cockburn Central, the fast-emerging capital of the Perth southern metropolitan region.

Since the first buildings rose from the ground in 2008, Cockburn Central has become a vibrant combination of high-rise apartments, shops and businesses. It is also home to a multi award-winning aquatic and recreation centre (Cockburn ARC) and Fremantle Football Club.

What's coming to Cockburn Central?

With its recently approved \$1b expansion, Cockburn Gateway Shopping City is set to take the vibrant community heart of Cockburn to the next level. Stage one, anticipated to commence within two to three years, includes additional retail, cinemas, dining, entertainment, and childcare, making it one of Perth's best retail and entertainment destinations.

Construction of the new \$237m bridge over Kwinana Freeway connecting Armadale Road to North Lake Road is complete. This long-awaited bridge will significantly ease congestion at Cockburn Central Station and Cockburn Gateway Shopping City.

While slightly smaller, Perron Group has lodged a development application with the City to build a \$5.5m pedestrian bridge over Beeliar Drive.

With the completion of the Thornlie-Cockburn Link in late 2024, southern suburbs' residents will be able to catch the train to Optus Stadium and Crown Resort in Burswood without needing to transfer through the Perth CBD.

But you do not need to leave Cockburn Central to have fun! We are expanding the gym at Australia's best recreation centre, Cockburn ARC, and Fremantle Football Club is adding spectator seating to its training facility so the community can get closer to the action.



The \$80m proposed Aventura surf park is looking epic. Aventura is working with the State Government to progress the proposal, and if successful, it will be the largest in the southern hemisphere. Offering not only killer waves, but a boutique 500-bed surf hotel, health and wellness centre and a unique function and events space for surfers and non-surfers alike.

Bethesda Health Care is currently constructing the first private Mental Health Service south of the river which will employ up to 100 staff and offer 40 overnight beds and a Mental Health and Wellbeing Centre. It's due to open 2022-2023.

So as you can see, whether you work, live or play in the City of Cockburn, Cockburn Central is the best place to be.
