
We recently announced our first-ever inductees to the Cockburn Arts Hall of Fame, demonstrating the enormous breadth of talent we have in Cockburn.

Have your say on the draft Tree Protection Policy

Under the draft policy, a regulated tree on private land

We're working to find the right balance between keeping our beautiful large trees and making space for new homes and developments on private land.

Community feedback will help inform decision-makers as they consider whether to adopt this local planning policy.

The Tree Protection Policy will outline when a development approval would be needed to remove a large or significant tree (regulated tree) and how those decisions will be made.

The draft policy is open for public feedback until 1 September on the City's community consultation platform, Comment on Cockburn.

- Listed on the City's Significant Tree Register

If adopted, the policy would introduce a formal process for assessing the removal or damage of regulated trees, ensuring any such plans are thoroughly reviewed and alternatives are explored.

Hammond Road Duplication – Russell Road to Rowley Road

The City of Cockburn is planning upgrades to Hammond Road (Russell Road to Rowley Road) to improve traffic flow, safety and access. We're seeking early community input to help shape the design before construction begins.

Fireworks Policy

The City of Cockburn is seeking feedback on its Draft Fireworks Policy, which aims to improve safety, reduce environmental impacts and guide event planning. The Department of Energy, Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety remains the decision-maker on fireworks approvals, but this policy will help the City respond to applications and decide whether to include fireworks at its events. Feedback closes at 4pm, Friday 29 August.

Our Economy



We believe Cockburn is the best place to live, work and play.

Satisfaction with the City of Cockburn among residents is high because we keep our rates low and work hard to keep our communities looking great while maintaining a solid financial position and giving back generously to the community.

The City is operating in the same challenging, high-cost environment as its community, paying more to run services and maintain and build infrastructure for a rapidly growing population. Despite this, we are committed to keeping rate rises low, given the financial pressures on our ratepayers.


The average rate increase for the last five years in Cockburn is 3.40 per cent, lower than the Perth CPI of 4.53 per cent and the Local Government Cost Index of 4.22 per cent. The average cost of rates in the City of Cockburn is \$38 per week for the wide range of services we offer.



- We organise an annual verge tree planting program
- We plant more than 50,000 native seedlings a year
- We support the community in achieving net zero emissions by 2050 by:

Council approves budgeting and rates, balancing the provision of services and infrastructure with keeping rates at an appropriate level. See page 4-5 for more information on the services Council offers.



Cockburn's BMX future races ahead

The City of Cockburn is proud to continue delivering high-quality recreation and leisure spaces for our growing community with the opening of Malabar Park BMX & Community Facility in Bibra Lake.

Home to the Cockburn BMX Club, the \$8.9 million upgrade to the facility features a Union Cycliste Internationale standard BMX racing track, allowing it to host national and international level events. A new five-metre start ramp will also support both training and competition needs, marking an exciting new chapter for the club and BMX enthusiasts across the region.

The facility is now a multipurpose space that not only supports Cockburn BMX operations but also provides space for local not-for-profit group Friends of the Community Inc. and the wider community, with a pump track, playground, public toilet and BBQ area.

Funding for the redevelopment includes a significant contribution of \$8.78 million from the City of Cockburn alongside a \$100,000 grant from the State Government's Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund, administered by the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries. The Cockburn BMX Club also pledged \$20,000 towards the project on completion.

The facility was officially opened by Mayor Howlett on Saturday 28 June at a lively event attended by more than 350 members of the community.

The City of Cockburn has undertaken a comprehensive review of its Strategic Community Plan (SCP), using liveability data collected in 2024. We use the data to ensure the SCP aligns with community values and priorities, to help us achieve our vision of making Cockburn the best place to be. Cockburn ARC has levelled up

The dust has settled and the fences are down. After months of hard work behind the scenes, the \$16.2 million expansion of Cockburn ARC is complete!

A huge thank you to our members and community for your patience during the build. The upgrade means more space, more equipment and more ways to train, stretch, sweat or simply switch off.

A bigger, better gym

The gym now spans over 1,500 m² and features 60 new pieces of equipment, including 10 squat racks, a multipurpose rig, a large functional training zone and all-abilities equipment. A spacious stretch area supports mobility, recovery and warm-ups. Plus, keep an eye out for new small group training classes held on the gym floor.

Smarter machines

We've introduced smart technology to make training easier, faster and more personalised.

Our new equipment is user-friendly and connects with the Cockburn ARC app to track workouts, sync your smartwatch and even launch your favourite apps all from the machine.

One of the standout additions is the Bio Circuit – an Al-powered strength circuit that remembers your settings and automatically adjusts, guiding you through a full-body workout with minimal set-up.

Our Environment

Cut waste and costs at refill station

Since April, Cockburn ARC has been home to WA's first permanent zero-waste refill station, making it easy for locals to reduce plastic use and cut household costs.

The Skipping Stones Refillery, located in the ARC foyer, lets you top up reusable containers with affordable, ecofriendly products including shampoo, conditioner, body wash, handwash, laundry liquid and dish detergent. All are WA-made and sold by weight, so you only pay for what you need.

By switching from single-use plastics to refills, residents are actively supporting the circular economy and reducing the 2.4 million tonnes of plastic Australians throw out each year.

The refillery is part of the City's commitment to sustainability, and a direct response to what our community has asked for: real options to live more sustainably. Bring your bottles (min 500ml) next time you visit!

Accolades flow for Marina

For the third time, Port Coogee Marina has earned International clean marina accreditations along with a first-time fish-friendly accreditation, cementing its place as one of WA's most environmentally responsible marinas.

The accreditations were awarded by the Marina Industries Association following a detailed audit in March 2025.



The marina achieved an impressive 98.4 per cent clean marina score and 96.15 per cent fish-friendly score.

In 2022, a fish diversity study recorded 71 finfish species, including 13 never seen in the marina before. From sea stars and giant cuttlefish to green turtles and dolphins, the marina is a sanctuary for a remarkable range of sea life.

Initiatives like WA's first seabin (installed in 2019), battery and e-waste recycling, and spill-prevention systems show the City's leadership in marina sustainability.

Mayor Logan Howlett said the inductees' strong practices and links with Cockburn had helped inspire the area's unique appeal and personality.

"Cockburn is a community where the arts and artists have long been active, and we cherish and celebrate their contribution," Mayor Howlett said.

"As we announce the inaugural Arts Hall of Fame, we hope it will further encourage fledgling and future artists and supporters of the arts to keep chasing their dreams and aspirations, whether here in Cockburn or further afield.

"The arts play a vital role in all our lives, from creating our personal and community identities to enhancing wellbeing. They contribute to a rich inclusive and diverse culture, generating economic and social benefits for all."

Creative Programs Lead Ella Hetherington said Cockburn should be proud of its artistic diversity and depth of talent.

"Many artists have chosen to call Cockburn home, benefiting from a supportive environment perfect for creativity, with space and freedom to express and evolve art practices," Ms Hetherington said.



Ranger Services reality check

When you think of a City of Cockburn Ranger, what image springs to mind? Animal whisperer Robert Irwin? Tough-as-nails law enforcers? It might be time for a reality check.

Rangers do deal with animal management, but they're not wrangling wildlife. They're more likely scanning lost pets for microchips and reuniting them with grateful owners and educating the community about responsible pet ownership.

While they enforce local laws, it's not all about fines or tough talk. They're often investigating dumped or illegal rubbish and patrolling our parks, beaches and reserves.

Our Environment

Watch for wildlife

As the weather warms and wildflowers bloom, local animals become more active in Cockburn's bushland, wetlands and coastal reserves. Spring is a time of renewal, but wildlife needs space, especially when breeding and nesting.

Swooping birds: Protective parent birds like magpies may swoop to defend their young. Avoid known swooping areas, wear a hat and sunglasses, and walk (don't run) if swooped.


Young birds on the ground: Fledgling birds often leave the nest before they can fly well. Finding one on the ground doesn't always mean it needs help. If unsure, contact WA Wildlife or check our online guide.

Snakes: Increased snake activity occurs in spring. Keep dogs leashed and stick to the path. If you spot a snake, stay calm, retreat slowly and give it space. Never kill a snake – it's illegal and dangerous.

Public Waste Drop-off new location and hours

The City has relocated its Public Waste Drop-off at Henderson Waste Recovery Park. Residents now need to take their trailer passes and waste to 48 Dalison Avenue, roughly 1 km south of the original location.

The Public Waste Drop-off is open 8am-4pm every day except Wednesdays, when it is closed for maintenance. It's also closed on Good Friday, Christmas Day and New Year's Day. The Reuse Shop has not moved and can still be accessed at 920 Rockingham Road.

Wildflower season blooms in Cockburn

Spring is almost here, and with the Nyungar season of Djilba (August-September) comes one of Cockburn's most stunning natural displays – wildflowers in full bloom.

Cockburn is part of the Southwest Botanical Province, one of just 36 internationally recognised biodiversity hotspots on the planet. This means we're lucky to have some of the world's most unique and diverse plant life right on our doorstep.

Take the opportunity to explore local nature reserves, where a dazzling array of colours and species await. Some of the best spots to see wildflowers this season include:

- Frankland Reserve, Hammond Park
- Denis De Young Reserve, Banjup
- Roper Reserve, Hammond Park

You might encounter a variety of delicate blooms such as the Donkey Orchid, Silky Blue Orchid, Milkmaids, Mangles Kangaroo Paw, Running Postman, Firewood Banksia, and Pixie Mops, to name just a few.

While you're out enjoying nature, please remember:

- Stick to marked paths to protect fragile plants
- It's illegal to pick wildflowers leave them for others to enjoy and for native species to thrive.
