Excessive barking

Dogs bark for many reasons including inappropriate confinement, passing distractions, isolation, guarding, anxiety, discomfort, breeding and seeking attention to name a few. Dogs often bark excessively when their owners are not at home.

Causes and possible solutions

Owners are responsible for any disturbances caused by their dog's excessive barking. It is important to work out why your dog is barking so the issue can be resolved in a civil and timely nature.

Distractions	 A soft playing radio may block out external noises If your dog barks at regular disturbances keep it inside or enclosed during these times If your dog is barking at distractions over the fence, move the dog or put up a barrier to keep it away from that area If your dog barks at gaps in the fence, fill in the gaps If your dog barks at passers-by, block its view.
