






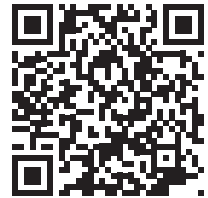



## What should you do if you see a turtle?

This wetland is home to a near threatened species of snake-necked turtle. In spring and summer (peaking September-November) these turtles travel away from the wetland to search for a nesting site. During this journey, they are vulnerable to vehicle strike and predation.

### *You can help our turtles!*

-  Record your turtle and nest sightings using Turtle Sat (QR code right)
-  They are not lost – If they need help, assist them in the direction they were heading.
-  Keep your dogs on leash
-  Protect them from predators. It is best to keep your distance, but you can wave off ravens if they are attacking
-  Drive slowly around wetlands.
